Post-High School Options

- 4 year colleges or universities
- 2 year colleges
 - MassTransfer
- Technical Colleges/Trade Schools
- Military Academy
- Military Service
- Gap or Service Year
- Employment



Student's Responsibilities

- Involve parents/guardians
- Make an appointment (via email) to speak with counselor about all options
- Put forth your best academic effort (all year long)
- Get Your Resume Ready To Go!

If Applying to College:

- Get familiar with Collegeboard, Naviance, & CommonApp
- Research potential schools of interest
- Know each school's deadline
- Submit all <u>transcript requests at least 2 weeks prior!</u>
- Submit brag sheets at least 1 month prior!

Gap Year

-Great option if you aren't sure what you want to do after graduating

-Programs vary from spending a year (or two) learning farming techniques to doing service in another city or an internship in another country

Employment

- Have a resume ready to go! We will be sharing resume resources and providing workshops after school

Certificate/Technical Programs

- Great if you want to continue learning what you focused on in shop or try something new
- Often 1 or 2 Years

Community College

- Sometimes requires college placement test for course/level placement
- Do not usually require letters of recommendation
- Scholarships & honors programs for high-achieving students
- No housing on campus in Massachusetts
 - Upstate NY and Maine offer some housing options
- Huge Variety of Degree/Certificate Programs
- Transfer to 4 year colleges after 1 or 2 years through agreements with state colleges (MassTransfer Program/Commonwealth Commitment)

Admission Factors Colleges Consider

- GPA and Class Rank
- SAT/ACT scores (Most Schools Optional This Year)
- Rigor of high school record (transcript)
- Senior year academic performance
- Extracurricular activities/ Community Service/ Co-op Placement/Internship
- College essay
- Recommendations
- Interview (if applicable)
- "Demonstrated Interest"

Admission Categories

- <u>REACH</u> The student's GPA/course load/test scores fall below the historical averages for the college and / or past MHS students
- MATCH The student's GPA/course load/test scores fall within the historical averages for the college and / or past MHS students
- <u>BEST BET</u> The student's GPA/course load/test scores fall above the historical averages for the college and / or past MHS students

Test Optional: What Has Changed?

- Nearly every college/university is test-optional (for the incoming Fall 2022 class). <u>They do NOT require</u> <u>SAT/ACT Scores</u>
- If you would like you CAN still submit SAT/ACT Scores
- Colleges will not penalize you for selecting "test optional"
- Colleges understand Covid has made taking these tests very difficult

Test Optional: What Has Changed?

- Stronger Emphasis on Essays/Recommendations
- School-Specific Measures
 - Example: In place of SAT/ACT, Brandeis requires 3 AP exam scores or graded analytical writing sample
- Very Important to Individually Check Each School's Test-Optional Information

Application Deadlines

- Early Decision / Early Action
 - Usually Nov 1 or Nov 15
- Regular Admission
 - Often Jan 1st, but can be as early as Nov 30 or Dec 1st
- Rolling Admission
 - Anytime The earlier, the better
- Application materials must be received by guidance department <u>2 weeks prior</u> to application deadline

Note on Early Decision/Action

Applying to an ED or EA plan is most appropriate for a student who:

- Has researched to find a school that is a strong match academically, socially and geographically.
- Is absolutely sure that the college is the first choice (for ED applications).
- Meets or exceeds the admission profile for the college for SAT scores, GPA and class rank.





Two Important Accounts!

Common App

Account for STUDENTS to send their college applications

Student completes on his/her own

Naviance

Account for MHS Staff to send the application materials


Student adds schools, adds teachers, signs FERPA waiver, then MHS Staff completes


The Linking Common App & Naviance Sheet looks like this on Google Classroom:

Linking Common App & Naviance

Complete these steps **BEFORE** your first senior college meeting:

- STEP 1: Go to: www.commonapp.org
- STEP 2: Register for the Common App (you <u>must</u> use the same email address/username as your Naviance account)
- STEP 3: Complete Initial Common App tasks:
 - 1. Click the Common App tab, indicate your sex and whether or not you have used any other names
 - Complete the first section of the <u>Education Tab</u> (add your current school information + date of entry.)
 This is the only information you need to complete as part of the education tab prior to our first meeting.
 - 3. Add at least one college to your My College List.
 - Click 'My Colleges' then follow prompts via College Search to add desired colleges to your list
 - Search by college name or city, then click the PLUS sign to add to your list





- STEP 4: Return to the 'My Colleges' Tab and select one of your colleges on the left hand side
 - Scroll down to "Recommenders and FFRPA"

Meet With Your Counselor

- Make an appointment with your counselor
 - October appointments for Early Action/Early Decision
 - November/December for Regular Decision
- Invite parent/guardian if possible
- Come Prepared
 - Bring a list of colleges
 - Have your Common App & Naviance linked
 - Any other materials you have

REVIEW

- 1. Share video with parents/guardians
- 2. Create a CommonApp/ Update & link to Naviance
- 3. Meet with your Counselor
 In meeting you will discuss with your counselor:
 - a. Request Teacher Letter(s) of Recommendation (2)
 - If Needed, Send your SAT/ACT scores directly through Collegeboard.org or ACT.org to the colleges and NCAA (for athletes)
 - c. Turn in your transcript request form
 - d. Submit your application
 - e. Write thank you notes
